"And you shall write them on your doorposts on your gates."

In this week's parasha we read of the obligation to place mezuzot on the doorposts of our home. As we know, the custom is to place the mezuzah at an angle on the right-hand side of the door as one enters the room.

There is an important reason for placing the mezuzah at an angle and one which has great value for each of us.

The Rabbis argue as to how one must place a mezuzah on the door. The sage Rashi explained that it needs to be vertical. His grandson, known as Rabeinu Tam, argued and said it needs to be horizontal. In what is the only case that I know of, Jewish law decided to compromise and place the mezuzah at an angle. It chose not to decide between the two.

The lesson for us is beautiful. The mezuzah is the first mitzvah that we encounter as we enter the room. We traditionally extend our hand to kiss it. What should we be thinking about while we kiss the mezuzah? I believe that we should focus on the argument between Rashi and Rabeinu Tam. An argument between a grandfather and grandson, that could have disrupted the harmony within the family. The resultant compromise led to shalom, peace in the home. That, I believe is the lesson of mezuzah.

As we enter the room, be it to greet our spouses, our children or our teachers, we pause and kiss the mezuzah. We pause and think about the concept of Shalom Bayit, peace in the home. We pause and think, "My understanding of the situation may not be as accurate as I believed. Maybe there is another way of understanding it. Maybe I need to give a little so that the home can be a bastion of peace and love."

As Steven Covey writes in his seven habits of highly effective people, seek first to understand and then to be understood.

The mezuzah teaches us the art of compromise and is the true symbol for peace in the home.
