As we gather this Shabbat, we stand on the edge of something truly magnificent — the beginning of the Ten Days of Teshuvah, starting with Rosh Hashanah. It's not just the start of a new calendar year. It's the moment we, the Jewish People, are invited to participate in a royal encounter — to meet the Creator of the Universe.

This experience is open to all, but it's reserved for a unique few: Am Yisrael. And it's unlike any other time of year.

Throughout the year, we refer to God as *HaKel HaKadosh* — the Holy God. But, beginning with Rosh Hashanah, we shift to *HaMelech HaKadosh* — the Holy King. This isn't just a poetic flourish; it's halachically significant. If someone mistakenly says *HaKel HaKadosh* in the Amidah during these days, they must repeat the entire prayer. It's as if the email was sent to the wrong address — returned to sender.

The shofar is the trumpet that announces this shift. Chassidic masters teach that Rosh Hashanah night is the **night of coronation** — when we crown Hashem as King of the world.

And with the arrival of royalty, there are expectations.

When a king visits, we elevate our conduct. Our speech, our actions, our rituals — all must reflect the dignity of the moment. The King comes to tour His kingdom, to see what we've built,

what we've achieved, and how we've grown. He meets with the leadership, hears our concerns, and evaluates our performance. Are we living up to our potential? Are we fulfilling our roles?

The liturgy of this season reflects these themes of **coronation**, **arrival**, **and judgment**. The shofar calls us to wake up — to reflect on who we are, what we've become, and who we want to be. These aren't questions we answer in a single moment. That's why we're given ten days — ten days to look inward, to recalibrate, and to return.

So tonight, as we welcome this Shabbat, let's begin preparing ourselves — spiritually and emotionally — for the arrival of the King. Let's reflect on the year that was, and the year we hope to build. And let's enter Rosh Hashanah ready to crown Hashem anew, with sincerity, joy, and awe.
